Two comments have been made in this Newsletter concerning the paucity of Asian content at IFLA conferences. It is reassuring to see that Asia-related content is growing in Australian conferences, as evidenced by a whole-day session on Asia and the Pacific planned for the next ALIA conference in 1992 and a half-day session at the Special and Law Librarian's conference in 1991.

Library systems are beginning to appear which can handle a non-Roman script or a group of non-Roman scripts, although few offer the capability of handling multiple scripts yet. This issue contains an interesting article by David Yeo of Dynix Australia, concerning the CJK version of Dynix.

Lily Hu has left Baillieu Library, Melbourne University, to take up a position in Hong Kong. Lily submitted an article on Baillieu Library before leaving Australia, which describes the background to and scope of the Chinese collection. We wish her well in Hong Kong, and hope to see her from time to time.

As more material was received than could be included in this newsletter, a special issue is planned for February 1991. If the trend continues, the Committee will consider increasing the frequency to three newsletters a year.
