**Workshop                                      21-23 February 1998                      Canberra**

A three-day workshop called "Electronic Identities in East Asia: Media, Culture and Diasporas" will be held from 21 to 23 February 1998, organised by Tessa Morris-Suzuki and Morris Low, Division of Pacific and Asian History, and Ben Penny, Humanities Research Centre, Australian National University, Canberra.

It will provide a forum in which to develop ideas on the interaction between electronic media (e.g. television, video, computer networks) and constructions of national/ethnic/gender identities in Japan, China and Korea. One feature of the workshop will be the use of visual representations (e.g. relevant videos, CD-ROM images) which reflect how technology mediates identities in Asia, focusing on East Asia.
