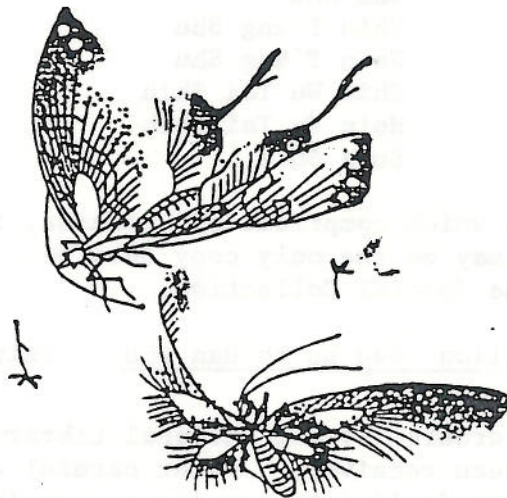

## IMPORTANT ACQUISITIONS

### The Australian National University Library

With the assistance of extra funds from the Library in the last few months, quite a number of expensive items have been ordered. On the Western language side, all the available microform titles issued by University Publications of America relating to US Government documents on China and Japan were selected. On the Asian language side, the following multi-volume sets were acquired.

#### Chinese

1. Large character edition of Thirteen Dynastic Histories of China. Shanghai, 1972-76.

This was a project launched around 1972 to print a punctuated edition of the Twenty-four Dynastic Histories of China in large Sung type printing on traditional Chinese paper and in traditional binding format. It was intended to print only a very limited edition for Mao Tse-tung's own use. However, after the death of Mao, the project was abandoned due to the high costs involved. Only 13 out of the 24 histories were actually printed. They are as follows:

This edition, which comprises 836 volumes, is very rare even in China and may be the only copy outside. It will be located in the Special Collection.

2. Wen-Yüan Pavilion Ssu kü ch'üan shu. Taipei, 1983-86.  
1500 vols.

This set was ordered by the National Library and part of it has already been received. After careful consideration, the ANU Library decided to acquire a copy in anticipation of the likely demands by its users, and for its own collection. Any library interested in buying the Chen pen (Selections

from the Ssu k'u ch'üan shu) in 13 series should contact the ANU Library.

### Japanese

1. Kyōwa. Reprint. 362 volumes.  
Originally published by The Mantetsu (Manchurian Railway Society), it contains information about the Society's activities, including statistics, personnel movement, international relations, etc.  
40 volumes are reprints.
2. Kokugogaku shiryō shūsei (Collection of Japanese Classical Language). 54 reels (Microfilm). Tokyo, Yushodō, 1980.  
This collection compiled by Dr Kanji Matsui (1863-1945), a leading authority on Japanese language from the Seikado Library, Tokyo, comprises 472 manuscripts and printed books in 769 volumes. It contains fundamental papers published by many celebrated scholars from the Edo to Meiji eras, covering a wide range of topics on the Japanese language.
3. Koten bunko (Classic Library). Tokyo, Koten Bunko, 1946-1947.  
A collection of rare and valuable literary texts, many of which are not available elsewhere. This Library holds volumes 368 onwards and volumes 1-367 have recently been received to complete the holdings.
4. Engei gahō  
This is a journal on Japanese performing arts, beginning in the early 1900s up to the outbreak of World War II. Most of the set is in original form.
5. Fujo shimbun (Women's newspaper). Reprint. Approx. 100 vols. Ed. by Shirō Fukushima. Tokyo, Fuji Shuppan, 1982- .  
A complete reprint edition of Fujo shimbun which was published weekly for 43 years throughout the Meiji, Taishō, and Shōwa periods (1900-1942). Although this is highly esteemed as one of the best primary source materials for women's studies in Japan as well as modern Japanese history, the material remained in the National Diet Library and in the University of Tokyo until recently. The editor, a pioneer of women's liberation, discusses a wide range of women's rights, such as women's suffrage, the abolition of licensed prostitution, the ethics of feminism and women's education. The current issues contain contemporary news on similar topics.

6. Teikoku bunko. 94 vols. Tokyo, Hakubunkan, 1890-1908.

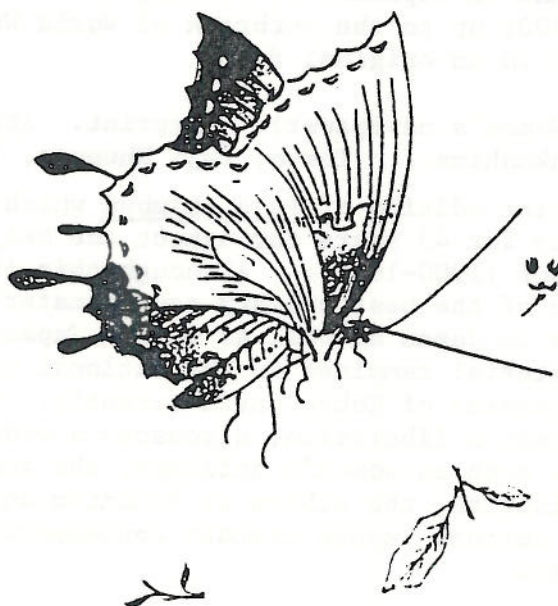
This was originally published as a hundred volume set of Japanese literary works in the Edo period (17th-19th cent.). Many of the titles are not available elsewhere.

7. Nihon kagaku taikei (Grand Systematic Collection of Japanese Waka Studies), comp. by Nobutsuna Sasaki. Tokyo, Kazama Shobō, 1972-81. 15 vols.

Many studies of Japanese classical literature are devoted to Waka which began appearing in the Nara period. The compiler of this work has selected about 180 chapters from various books on Waka. He has avoided the confusion which often exists in relation to original texts in studies of Waka and has succeeded in establishing reliable texts. Also included are other versions of the texts for comparison. Each volume includes bibliographical details of the texts used.
